
Newest equipment at the practice

Equinosis lameness locator:

Over the last couple of months we have been trialling an Equinosis lameness locator at the practice and are pleased now to be using it for a majority of lameness cases that are present to the practice. The system works on the principal of 3 gyroscopes that are positioned on the horses head, sacroiliac and right fore limb. These sensors work by measuring movement of the horses head in relation to placement of the

for limbs and symmetry of the movement of the pelvis. The system is able to assess lameness on a straight line and also on the lunge, on a range of different surfaces. The system also has a sensor that can be placed on the rider in cases where lameness is only seen when ridden.

These sensors send signals to a tablet which has special software that



generates the results. The results can then be interpreted by the treating vet in conjunction with their clinical exam and assessment of the lameness. Once the lameness has be been identified and graded. Nerve blocks can be placed and the system can be used

to objectively measure the affect of each block on the lameness.

Here is a quick reminder of how our very popular Free Zone scheme operates:

- Visits must be pre-booked by 10am the day before the visit at the latest (for Monday 10am on a Friday).
- We will co-ordinate the visits geographically and allocate a 2 hour timeslot. We cannot guarantee you a specific time, but will try to accommodate your requirements. Due to busy Zone days, Vets are unable to call clients on the day with updated times.
- To confirm your appointment and time you need to call us between 3pm and 5pm the day before your visit (Friday for Monday zone visits)
- The scheme is designed for most routine work, for example vaccinations, dentals, microchips, initial examinations. More detailed or prolonged work will need to be booked in the usual way.



Christmas and New Year Opening Times:

Our 24 hours emergency service will be provided as usual throughout the Festive period.

- Open as usual until 5pm on Christmas Eve
- Closed, except for emergencies, on Christmas Day and Boxing Day.
- Open as usual from 27th 31st December, closing at 5pm on 31st December.
- Closed, except for emergencies, on New Year's Day.
- Open as usual from 2nd January.
- To ensure case continuity with the same Vet, we would advise re-examinations not to be booked on Zones unless unavoidable.

• Zone visits are specifically payment at time or payment in advance, payment can also be made when zone times are given.

• To find out which day of the week your zone day is, you can visit our website or give the clinic a call.
