## Our busy clinic!

## **Resumption of British Eventing**

#### **Microchips:**

This October it becomes a legal requirement that all horses, ponies and donkeys are microchipped regardless of age in order to allow owner traceability and therefore help to prevent abuse. However, it will stand that you have until 6 months of age or the end of December to get your youngsters chipped.

Microchipping is a quick procedure which consists of the insertion of the chip using a needle in the crest of the neck, so is less likely to move. It is easy for us to do at the time of vaccination or dentistry, so is ideal to add on when your horse is having routine health care. If your horse does not have a chip or if you aren't sure please do ask one of our vets to check for you. Some horses have a passport but they might not be chipped, especially elderly horses.

### **Coronavirus Update:**

We are continuing to carry out most of our normal work, subject to a strict risk assessment. At the time of booking your appointment, you will be asked a few short questions below to ascertain the safety of carrying out the work. Where there are concerns about the safety or necessity of carrying out work, you will be passed to a vet to discuss the practicalities of carrying the work out.

We are still not carrying out any dentals unsedated, due to the risk associated with doing so without someone controlling the head of the horse. We may also need to postpone some procedures, or have horses brought into the clinic to allow us to carry out some procedures safely, while maintaining our 2 metre distance at this time. Please have a face mask available in case it becomes necessary to assist the vet.

We are asking all clients to ensure that only one person is present with the horse we are examining. This is for the safety of our staff and our clients. We are regularly reviewing the situation, and further information will be made available on our Facebook page and in future newsletters.
